Representative International Instruments on Disaster Response

There is currently no comprehensive international legal framework governing international relief in non-conflict disasters. However, there are some rele-vant multilateral treaties, a multitude of bilateral agreements, as well as an important number of resolutions, declarations, guidelines, models and other non-binding but nevertheless authoritative instruments.
