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IFRC COVID-19 Emergency Decree Pro Bono Research: Indonesia

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This research has not taken into any news articles, regulations and/or policies issued after 7AM EDT (Friday, 27 March 2020).

1. Is there coordination between state and non-state actors, e.g. through a national emergency response mechanism?

Answer:

Yes, in addition to coordination with RC/humanitarian actors as set out in No. 2 below, the Indonesian government has formed a task force for handling the spread of COVID-19. The government has also coordinated with a number of hospitals and granted monthly incentives to medical team members. The Indonesian government has further received support from corporate players.

FORMATION OF TASK FORCE

*Indonesian President Joko Widodo formed a task force for the acceleration of handling COVID-19 (the “**Task Force**”) on 13 March 2020 by virtue of the Decree of the President of the Republic of Indonesia No. 7 of 2020 concerning the Task Force for the Acceleration of Handling of COVID-19 as amended by Decree of the President of the Republic of Indonesia No. 9 of 2020 (“**COVID-19 Presidential Decree**”). The Task Force consists of instructors and executors which consist of numerous ministries in Indonesia.*

On March 18, 2020, the Task Force launched a portal www.covid19.go.id as an official source of information on handling the global pandemic COVID-19. The covid19.go.id site was developed by Risk Communication and Public Engagement Team for COVID-19 countermeasures. The team consisted of various elements namely the government, the United Nations Agency (UNICEF, WHO, etc.), international development partners, civil society organizations and the business world.

This website aims to ensure that the public has access to official and accurate information about overcoming the COVID-19 outbreak in Indonesia. The website also contains three (3) simple guidelines for the community’s reference, namely “How to Reduce the Risk of Transmission,” “Finding the Right Information” and “What to Do if Getting Sick”. Statistical data on the number of positive cases of COVID-19 is updated in real-time and is expected to be a reference for various parties, especially the media partners in their reporting.

COORDINATION WITH HOSPITALS AND MONTHLY INCENTIVES FOR MEDICAL TEAMS

The Indonesian government continuously strengthens its coordination with plenty of hospitals across the region. Based on Decree of the Minister of Health of Indonesia No. HK.01.07/MENKES/169/2020 on Determination of Hospital References of Certain Emerging



Infection Disease dated 10 March 2020, there are 132 private hospitals, both private and public, to handle COVID-19 patients and since 23 March 2020, Wisma Atlet, which is used to be a venue where ASEAN Games held, has now officially been set as an urgent hospital to handle COVID-19 patients with the capacity of 3,000 people. As the representative of the government, Muhadjir Effendy, Minister of Coordination for Human Development and Culture said that the government will fully pay for the treatment of COVID-19 patients to its hospitals by having a partnership with The Indonesian National Health Insurance to fasten the fund transfer to hospitals.

Further, in a press conference on 23 March 2020, the President of Republic of Indonesia, Joko Widodo stated that he determined to grant medical teams monthly incentives as a form of appreciation for their hard work in the following amounts:

In addition to the above, the family of a medical personnel who passes away due to handling COVID-19 will receive compensation in the amount of IDR 300 million (~US\$18,588.51).

In the press conference dated 24 March 2020, Joko Widodo requested the Ministry of Health of Republic of Indonesia to prioritize COVID-19 rapid tests for medical personnel who treat patients positively infected with COVID-19.

SUPPORTS FROM CORPORATE PLAYERS

While there is no formal coordination between the Indonesian and corporate players in Indonesia, several corporate players in Indonesia have taken the initiatives to contribute by way of donations, such as follows:

- (a) Astra Group¹ has donated numerous COVID-19 prevention equipment such as test equipment, Personal Protective Equipment (“PPE”), hand sanitizer, disinfection, 100 unit of Daihatsu Gran Max Pick Up and 10 unit of truck for disinfectant spraying vehicles conducted by the Red Cross Society (Palang Merah Indonesia – “PMI”). To distribute these donations equally, Astra Group built a partnership with Ministry of Health of the Republic of Indonesia, BNPB, Indonesian Lung Doctors Association (Perhimpunan Dokter Paru Indonesia - PDPI), medical laboratories, and government referral hospitals

worth IDR 5.5 billion (~US\$ 340,778.83) and IDR 40 billion (~US\$ 24,783,915.20) to a foundation which accommodates and manages funds from corporate group in Indonesia.

- (b) *PT Aplikasi Karya Anak Bangsa, a multi-service and digital payment technology group in Indonesia which known for one of their railing services called “Gojek” has created US\$ 6 million fund to support all drivers, merchants and other partners across the region whose income has been affected amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The Gojek partner support fund will be administered through a newly created foundation, Anak Bangsa Bisa Foundation. The foundation will have a partnership with multiple stakeholders including government, civil society groups and driver groups with the priority of supplementing drivers’ and other partners’ income through this period. The funding will come from three sources such as 25% of an annual salary of Gojek’s co-CEOs and Gojek’s senior management team, Gojek’s annual salary increase budget will be redirected to the support fund and public donation which particularly comes from corporate partners.*
- (c) *Media Group Foundation, a foundation established by Media Group (one of the largest Indonesian media groups that has, among others, a television channel called MetroTV) distributed PPE packages for medical workers to City Governor of Bogor. The PPE packages contain 550 N95 Masks, 9,000 medical gloves, 30 protector glasses, 2,500 surgical masks, 60 hazmat suits, and 120 hand sanitizers.*
- (d) *PT Pelabuhan Indonesia I (Persero) or Pelindo, an Indonesian port services state-owned enterprise, conducts disinfection spraying, body temperature checking, and social standing protocol in both working area and public services area. Every public facility in passenger terminal and offices managed by Pelindo is marked with a space guidance line of 1 meter.*

2. Is there mention of the role of Red Cross (RC) or humanitarian actors? In what areas/sectors? What responsibilities are ascribed to RC?

Answer:

Yes, please see below the involvement of RC in Indonesia and other humanitarian actors involved, with details on the areas/sectors where they operate and their responsibilities:

(a) PMI

As a member of International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, PMI has been assisting the Indonesian government with the prevention/containment of the spread of COVID-19 in Indonesia by conducting various COVID-19 prevention and containment programs in Indonesia, including as follows:

- (i) *On February 25, 2020, PMI campaigned the “Million Masks Movement for Indonesia” as a fundraising movement at <https://benihbaik.com/campaign/sejutamaskeruntindonesia> for the procurement of masks as a solution to overcome the depletion of mask supplies at PMI and the drastic increase of the price of masks. The masks were to be distributed by PMI for free to the people who need it.*



- (ii) *On March 17, 2020, PMI sent 3,000 volunteers to help the treatment of COVID-19 patients throughout Indonesia. PMI volunteers also held mass disinfectant spraying activities throughout Indonesia.*
- (iii) *On March 19, 2020, PMI prepared additional logistics warehouses to store logistics related to handling COVID-19 such as the construction of 3 hall warehouses with a size of 10 x 32 meter to store spray equipment, disinfectant liquids, gloves, boots, goggles, and sterile masks and clothes and 3 workspaces measuring 10 x 24 meters to monitor logistical stock and distribution. Currently, PMI has 6 Regional Warehouses spread across Padang (West Sumatra), Serang (Banten), Gresik (East Java), Semarang (Central Java), Banjarmasin (South Kalimantan) and Makassar (South Sulawesi).*

PMI has also been a successful forum for collecting donations from various parties, including Shopee which contributed IDR 1 billion (~US\$ 61,862.05) and youth influencer in Indonesia Rachel Venya who contributed IDR 2 billion (~US\$123,724.09). These donations will later be used to support PMI's Non-Natural Disasters Emergency Program for COVID-19, which includes meeting the needs of the PPE for medical personnel in PMI hospitals, PMI clinics and PMI blood donor units in several regions in Indonesia. In addition, the donations will also be used to fund disinfecting spraying activities, ambulance services, first aid/family care services, logistics distribution services, as well as psychosocial services.

(b) *Amnesty International Indonesia*

Amnesty International Indonesia is a non-governmental organization with its headquarters in the United Kingdom focused on human rights. On 21 March 2020, Amnesty International Indonesia sent an open letter to President Joko Widodo for the government to fulfill the rights of health workers in the midst of the COVID-19 outbreak. The open letter was written by Amnesty International Indonesia together with the Indonesian Doctors Association, the Indonesian Dentists Association, the Indonesian National Nurses Association, the Indonesian Midwives Association, and the Indonesian Pharmacists Association. The open letter urged President Joko Widodo, the Ministry of Health of the Republic Indonesia, and all levels of the Department of Health at the regional level to ensure that (i) the distribution of PPEs is carried out fairly and equally throughout the regions, both in quality and quantity; (ii) the COVID-19 infection care and treatment protocol for health workers are implemented properly so as to ensure such health workers' health and safety; and (iii) transparent and comprehensive information about medical workers, health workers, and other health workers who are exposed to COVID-19 could be immediately provided and they such workers could access health services. As of note, there has been no public response regarding the letter, however up to the date of this response, the government has carried out every single request from Amnesty International Indonesia as further explained thoroughly in this response.

(c) *Lokataru Foundation*

Lokataru Foundation is an organization that works for advocacy and movement on human rights. On March 21, 2020, Lokataru Foundation, together with the Civil Society Coalition consisting of the Indonesian Alliance of Independent Journalists (Aliansi Jurnalis Independen - AJI), Asia Justice and Rights (AJAR), Amnesty International Indonesia, the Commission for the Disappeared and Victim of Violence (Komisi untuk



Orang Hilang dan Korban Tindak Kekerasan - KontraS), Legal Aid Institute (Lembaga Bantuan Hukum - LBH), Jakarta Community Law (Lembaga Bantuan Hukum - LBH), Lokataru, Migrant Care, Democratic Education Association (Perhimpunan Pendidikan Demokrasi - P2D), Indonesian Center for Law and Policy Studies (Pusat Studi Hukum dan Kebijakan Indonesia - PSHK), Transparency International Indonesia (TII), Indonesian Forum for the Environment (Wahana Lingkungan Hidup Indonesia - WALHI), and Indonesian Legal Aid Foundation (Yayasan Lembaga Bantuan Hukum Indonesia - YLBHI)), published a press release to urge the Indonesian government to:

- (i) Provide accurate, comprehensive and periodic public information regarding the spread and transmission risk of COVID-19.*
- (ii) Clarify the mechanism and effectiveness of mass tests without imposing the cost to the public. Prioritize examinations for people who have been exposed to or interacted with positive patients.*
- (iii) Urge the central government to ensure the availability of PPE and facilities needed for health workers (doctors and nurses), and administrative staff.*
- (iv) Issue a decision to tackle COVID-19 based on recommendations from health experts and not on political grounds or other reasons, including the determination of the quarantine zone.*
- (v) Urge the Minister of Internal Affairs to mobilize and maximize the role of government agencies in informing and disseminating social distancing policies and involving the broadest public participation to prevent the further spread of COVID-19.*
- (vi) Urge the central government and local governments to work together with the community by increasing coordination and immediately taking strategic decisions to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and its effects on the safety of all the people of Indonesia.*

(d) United Nations Development Program (“UNDP”)

UNDP is the United Nations’ global development network that works to eradicate poverty and reduce inequalities through the sustainable development of nations, in more than 170 countries and territories. On 24 March 2020, UNDP carried out a partnership with Korean International Cooperation (“KOICA”) and the Ministry of Administrative and Bureaucratic Reform of the Republic of Indonesia (Kementerian Pendayagunaan Aparatur Negara dan Reformasi Birokrasi – “KemenPANRB”) to support the utilization of SP4N-LAPOR! or National Public Service Complaints Handling System which is now being used as a direct communication platform between the government and citizens to send vital information on COVID-19 (i.e filing recommendations, complaints, ideas, or question on COVID-19 through LAPOR! smartphone application, website (<https://www.lapor.go.id/>) and text messaging). The partnership established by UNDP with KOICA and KemenPANRB aims to enhance the digitalization of the platform and expand it by connecting it to all subnational governments in Indonesia.

(a) The Indonesia Disaster Awareness Movement Foundation (Yayasan Gerakan Indonesia Sadar Bencana –“Graisena”)



Graisena is running a fund-raising campaign via Instagram to provide aid to families whose breadwinners have been hospitalized. The families can request aid from Graisenia by contacting 082278134234 and providing a letter from the hospital confirming COVID-19 infection and the funder could transfer their funds to Graisenia's bank account. The collected money will be distributed to each family at US\$1.26 per day per person for a maximum duration of 45 days.

(b) *House of Humanitarian Solidarity of Jakarta*

The House of Humanitarian Solidarity of Jakarta, is a Non-government Organization ("NGO") which led by former Jesuit priest and activist Sandyawan Sumardi. On 23 March 2020, this NGO has launched an initiative to help disadvantaged communities in the capital during the COVID-19 crisis by producing and distributing handmade face masks and hand sanitizers. The public can donate by drop off the donations in the form of goods at the NGO's secretariat or money through online transfer to NGO's bank account.

(c) *One District One Entrepreneurship (One Kecamatan, One Center of Entrepreneurship – "OK OCE")*

Sandiaga Uno, former Deputy Governor of Jakarta, through OKE OCE program (a program found by the provincial governor of DKI Jakarta on entrepreneurship development) raising funds along with Glek coffee shop and the Yadas Foundation for COVID-19 patients or patients under surveillance who are the main income earners in their families.

(d) *Indonesian Conference on Religion and Peace ("ICRP")*

ICRP is a foundation which promotes and enhance the dialog and cooperation of cross faith. ICRP is now raising funds to buy face masks, disinfectants, hand sanitizers and staple needs for low-wage workers. The public who interested in donating to ICRCP can transfer funds directly to ICRP's bank account.

3. Are there exceptions to travel restrictions that will facilitate the movement of RC/humanitarian relief teams and/or aid across borders? What (if any) quarantine requirements or other conditions are attached?

Answer:

As of the date of this response, there are few travel restrictions applicable in Indonesia in the form of suspension or dismissal of certain visas and stay permits that may hinder the movement of RC/humanitarian relief teams and/or aid across borders, as follows:

- (a) *Regulation of MOLHR No. 7 of 2020 on Visa Issuance and Stay Permit in Respect to Prevent the Entry of COVID-19 dated 28 February 2020. Under this regulation, the issuance of visitor visa and visa on arrival is being suspended temporarily for foreigners who ever lived and/or visited the People's Republic of China within 14 days before entering the territory of the Republic of Indonesia. There is no exemption under this regulation with respect to humanitarian/medical aid teams who have ever lived and/or visited the People's Republic of China.*

- (b) *Regulation of MOLHR No. 8 of 2020 on Temporary Dismissal of Visit-Free Visa and Visa on Arrival and Issuance of Forced Stay Permit dated 18 March 2020. Under this regulation, the issuance of visit-free visa and visa on arrival are being suspended to the foreigners who previously obtain this privilege according to their country of origin. For the foreigners who are affected by the lockdown policy and thus unable them to fulfill immigration procedure, then the Indonesian government may grant forced stay permit, a limited stay permit, a permanent residence permit, a re-entry permit and an entry certificate to them with certain terms and conditions (e.g. declaration of healthiness from the health authority, have been living within 14 days in free COVID-19 country and ready to be quarantined for 14 days in Indonesia afterward.) There is no exemption under this regulation with respect to humanitarian/medical aid teams applying for such permit.*

Additionally, in connection with Eid Al-Fitr (Muslim annual feast) which involves the celebrants to visit their family in their hometown (known as “Mudik Lebaran”), we have noted from numerous news articles (e.g. <https://www.thejakartapost.com/news/2020/03/24/forget-mudik-this-year-govt-tells-people-as-idul-fitri-moves-closer.html>) that on 24 March 2020, the Minister of Transportation officially canceled the free Mudik Lebaran for 2020 as and advised the Indonesian citizens to stay at home during the celebration. There is, however, no clear prohibition from the Minister of Transportation for any person from traveling, and as such, we think that this policy will not hinder the movement of RC/humanitarian relief teams and/or aid across borders.

4. Are there exceptions to quarantines, curfews and other restrictions on movement that allow RC/humanitarian organizations access to vulnerable populations (including for psychosocial or non-medical aid)?

Answer:

While there is no regulation that expressly imposes quarantine requirements, we have noted from news articles (e.g. <https://www.msn.com/id-id/berita/nasional/71-tim-medis-di-rs-mitra-keluarga-depok-rampung-karantina/ar-BB11IZKt>) that medical teams in various hospitals in Indonesia that handled and/or made contacts with COVID-19 patients were required to be quarantined. It is unclear as to how such restrictions are applicable to RC/humanitarian organizations, and if there are any exceptions.

5. Have any special legal facilities or exemptions been put in place for the importation of medical aid or other relief items or personnel (International Disaster Response Law)? What (if any) quarantine requirements or other conditions are attached?

Answer:

COVID-19 Presidential Decree provides import duty and trade licensing exemptions that would be applicable to imports of goods used for handling COVID-19. COVID-19 Presidential Decree does not specify in detail on the kinds of goods exempted. Such exemptions require recommendation from BNPB.

6. Is the RC (or humanitarian organizations) categorized as 'essential' or 'emergency' services, for the purposes of exemptions to restrictions on business operations and opening hours?

Answer:

As of the date of this response, there are no restrictions on business operations and opening hours applicable in Indonesia.

7. What other measures are provided in the emergency decrees? (for governmental actors, for communities, for health workers, etc).

Answer:

As of the date of this response, other than COVID-19 Presidential Decree, the Indonesian government has issued the following regulations and/or decrees for government actors, health workers and communities applicable nation-wide and with respect to the regional regulations, the province of DKI Jakarta only:

- (a) *For government actors:*
- (i) *Circular of Minister of Finance No. SE-2/MK.1/2020 dated 2 March 2020 on the Prevention of Spreading of COVID-19 in the Environment of Ministry of Finance. Under this regulation, the protection for health and safety is provided for employees against spreading of COVID-19 in the environment of Ministry of Finance.*
 - (ii) *Instruction of Head of Foreign Investment and One-Stop Integrated Service No. 27 dated 3 March 2020 on the Increase of Awareness Towards the Risk of COVID-19 Infection. Under this regulation, face to face form of service is dismissed.*
 - (iii) *Circular of Department of Tourism and Creative Economy of DKI Jakarta No. 116/SE/2020 dated 3 March 2020 on the Increase of Awareness Toward COVID-19 In the Environment of Tourism Industry. Under this regulation, the protection for health and safety is provided for employees against spreading of COVID-19 in the environment of Tourism Industry.*
 - (iv) *Circular of Director General of Immigration No. IMI-1873.GR.01.01 dated 6 March 2020 on the Implementation of Visa and Permission to Stay in the Prevention of Incoming of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the guideline for implementing officers as well as clarity of information and certainty in service to the community is provided.*
 - (v) *Circular of Minister of Manpower No. M/2/HM.01/III/2020 dated 16 March 2020 on the Follow-Up Guide Related To Prevention of COVID-19 In The Environment of Ministry of Manpower. Under this regulation, the protection for health and safety is provided for employees against spreading of COVID-19 in the environment of Ministry of Manpower.*
 - (vi) *Circular of Minister of Administrative Reform and Bureaucratic Reform No. 19 dated 16 March 2020 on the Adjustment of Country Civil Aperture System in the Prevention of Spreading of Covid-19 in the Environment of Government Agencies. Under this regulation, the protection for health and safety is provided for employees against spreading of COVID-19 in the environment of Government Agencies.*
 - (vii) *Regulation of the Minister of Finance No. 19/PMK.07/2020 of 2020 dated 16 March 2020 on the Distribution and Usage of Funds, General Allocation Funds, and Incentive Funds of 2020 For The Purpose of Prevention Towards COVID-19.*

Under this regulation, certain category of funds are being allocated for handling COVID-19.

- (viii) Circular of the Director General of Customs and Excise No. SE-04/BC/2020 dated 17 March 2020 on the Exemption from Ethyl Alcohol Excise in the Continuation of Follow-Up Prevention of COVID-19. Under this regulation, implementation and guidelines for convenience in handling the COVID-19 is implemented.*
- (ix) Instruction of the Director General of Communities No. PAS-08.OT.02.02 dated 17 March 2020 the Prevention, Handling, Control and Recovery of COVID-19 in the Community Technical Unit. Under this regulation, the Yellow Zone prevention is implemented.*
- (x) Circular of General Prosecutor No. 2 dated 16 March 2020 and effective on 17 March 2020 on the Adjustment of Employee Work Systems in the Prevention of the Spreading of COVID-19 in the Environment of Prosecutor in the Republic of Indonesia. Under this regulation, the protection for health and safety is provided for employees against spreading of COVID-19 in the environment of Prosecutor In the Republic of Indonesia.*
- (xi) Circular of the Director General of Customs and Excise No. SE-02/BC/2020 dated 18 March 2020 on the Guidelines for Research on Importation of Goods Coming From China Using The ACFTA (Form E Ska) as an Epidemic Impact of COVID-19. This regulation is research guidelines for the importation of goods which are originated from China using the ACFTA preference tariff scheme (SKA Form E) as impact of COVID-19.*
- (xii) Letter of the Ministry of Law and Human Rights No. M.HH.PK.01.01.01-04 of 2020 on the Temporary Suspension on Sending the Prisoners to the Prison in the Environment of the Ministry of Law and Human Rights to Prevent the Spreading of COVID-19. Under this regulation, starting from 18 March 2020, every activities in form of visiting, trial in the court and acceptance of prisoners are suspended until further notification.*
- (xiii) President Instruction No. 4 of 2020 dated 20 March 2020 on the Refocusing of Activities, Budget Reallocation, as well as Procurement of Goods and Services in order to Accelerate the Handling of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the use of existing budget allocations is prioritizing for accelerating activities of handling COVID-19.*
- (xiv) Decree of Governor of DKI Jakarta No 337 dated 20 March 2020 on the Emergency Status of COVID-19 Outbreak in the Province of DKI Jakarta. Under this regulation, the emergency for 14 days pertaining COVID-19 is announced.*
- (xv) President Decree No. 9 of 2020 dated 20 March 2020 on the Amendment to President Decree No. 7 of 2020 on the Task Force for the Acceleration of Handling COVID-19. This is the main regulation concerning on the acceleration to handle the COVID-19 by forming special working team.*

- (xvi) *Circular of Ministry of Communication and Information No.2 dated 23 March 2020 on the Acceleration of Socialization of Prevention and Spread of COVID-19 at the Province and District/City. Under this regulation, the socialization by all kinds of media are encouraged for the purpose of awareness of COVID-19.*
 - (xvii) *Circular of Ministry of Education and Culture No. 4 dated 24 March 2020 on the Implementation of Education Policy in Emergency of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the dismissal of National Examination and Home Learning are implemented.*
 - (xviii) *Circular of Department of Education No. 32/SE/2020 dated 24 March 2020 on the Home Learning in the Emergency of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the dismissal of National Examination is implemented and the Home Learning is extended until 5 April 2020.*
- (b) *For health workers:*
- (i) *Decree of the Head of Health Human Resources Development and Department of Empowerment No. HK.02.02/1/0421/2020 dated 19 March 2020 on the Special Assignment of Individual Health in order of Emergency Disease due to COVID-19 in Indonesia of 2020. Under this regulation, the health workers are urged to be recruited which consist of doctors, nurses, environmental sanitation workers, pharmaceuticals, nutritionists, medical laboratory technology experts, surveillance, health epidemiologists, and other types of health workers to be further determined.*
 - (ii) *Instruction of Governor of DKI Jakarta No. 16 dated 25 February 2020 on the Increase of Awareness Towards the Risk of COVID-19 Infection. Under this regulation, the governor instruct all the Governmental Departments/Agencies/Institutions to support and socialize the awareness towards the risk of COVID-19 on each of their Departments/Agencies/Institutions.*
- (c) *For communities:*
- (i) *Regulation of Ministry of Law and Human Rights No. 7 of 2020 dated 28 February 2020 on the Granting of Visas and Residential Permits in order to Prevent Coronavirus Outbreaks. Under this regulation, the granting of free visitor's visa and visa on arrival shall be temporarily suspended for foreigners who have stayed in and/or visited the People's Republic of China within the period of fourteen (14) days prior to entering the Indonesian territory.*
 - (ii) *Circular of DKI Jakarta Education Agency No. 17/SE/2020 dated 2 March 2020 on the Increase of Awareness to Infection Risk of COVID-19. This regulation is continuation of Circular of DKI Jakarta Education Agency No. 16/SE/2020 for the school community to minimize activities in the crowd as well as to stay aware and stay alert also to self-isolate if the concerned is sick.*

- (iii) *Circular of Department of Transportation No. 10/SE/2020 dated 4 March 2020 on the Increase of Awareness toward the Risk of Infection of COVID-19 In Public Transport in the Province Of DKI Jakarta. Under this regulation, the awareness of communities towards COVID-19 as well as the virus symptoms, signs and ways of infecting are encouraged.*
- (iv) *Circular of the Director General of Labor Supervision and Occupational Health and Safety Supervision No. 5/193/AS.02.02/III/2020 dated 12 March 2020 on the Preparedness of the Spreading of COVID-19 in Workplace. Under this regulation, the labors are guided and educated on the preventive measures towards COVID-19.*
- (v) *Circular of Director General of Tax No. SE-13/PJ/2020 dated 15 March 2020 on the Guidelines for Implementation of Assignments During the Prevention of COVID-19 In The Environment of Tax. Under this regulation, the guidelines to work from home for employees of Director General of Tax is provided with taking into account of effectiveness and efficiency of public service.*
- (vi) *Circular of Department of Manpower, Transmigration and Energy of DKI Jakarta No. 14/SE/2020 dated 15 March 2020 on Working from Home. Under this regulation, labors/workers are being urged to work from home.*
- (vii) *Circular of Minister of Health No. HK.02.01/MENKES/202/2020 dated 16 March 2020 on the Protocol of Self-Isolation Within the Handling Of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the community is urged to implement the self-isolation to prevent worse spreading of COVID-19.*
- (viii) *Regulation of the Minister of Trade No. 23 of 2020 dated 16 March 2020 concerning Temporary Restriction on the Exports of Antiseptic, Mask Raw Materials, Personal Protective Equipment, and Masks, as amended by Regulation of the Minister of Trade No. 31 of 2020. Under this Regulation, President Joko Widodo prohibits export of masks and medical equipment until 30 June 2020.*
- (ix) *Circular of Minister of Manpower No. M/3/HK.04/III/2020 dated 17 March 2020 on the Protection of Workers/Labors and Business Continuity in the Prevention and Management of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the Wage Protection for Workers/Laborers are tend to be implemented.*
- (x) *Exclamation of Governor of DKI Jakarta No. 4 of 2020 dated 18 March 2020 on the Social Distancing Measure in Anticipating the Spread of COVID-19 in DKI Jakarta. Under this regulation, the DKI Jakarta governor encourage the community to implement self distancing by not going out of the house and suspend wedding receptions.*
- (xi) *Exclamation of Governor of DKI Jakarta No. 5 of 2020 dated 19 March 2020 on the Temporary Dismissal of the Religion Event and Worshipping in the House of Worship to Prevent the Spreading of COVID-19. Under this regulation, any religion event shall be dismissed for 14 days from 19 March 2020.*



- (xii) *Notification of the Head Police of Republic of Indonesia No. MAK/2/III/2020 dated 19 March 2020 on the Compliance to Government Policy in Handling the Spread of COVID-19. Under this regulation, the Head Police of Republic of Indonesia encourages the community not to held any social event and to stay aware.*
- (xiii) *Circular of Department of Tourism and Creative Economy of DKI Jakarta No. 160/SE/2020 dated 19 March 2020 on the temporary closure of the Implementation of Operational Activities in Tourism Industry in Calculation of COVID-19 Infection. Under this regulation, the community are urged to implement the spray fast acting on alcoholic spray disinfectant and to socialize to their employees on the business area pertaining the COVID-19.*
- (xiv) *Circular of Department of Tourism and Creative Economy of DKI Jakarta No. 160/SE/2020 dated 20 March 2020 on the Temporary Closure of Operational Activities in Tourism Industry in Calculation of COVID-19 Infection. Under this regulation, certain kinds of public place are required to be temporarily closed.*
Exclamation of Governor of DKI Jakarta No. 6 of 2020 dated 20 March 2020 on The Temporary Suspension of Office Activities in order to Prevent the Spreading of COVID-19 Outbreaks. Under this regulation, the governor urges on temporary suspension of office activities and working from home.
- (xv) *Circular of Department of Education No. 32/SE/2020 dated 24 March 2020 On the Home Learning in The Emergency of COVID-19. This Regulation Stipulates the Extension of Home Learning Until 5 April 2020 and the Dismissal of National Examination. Under this regulation, the home learning is extended to 5 April 2020.*

The regulations above are exclusive of any regulations issued by the Indonesian government for the purpose of preventing market crisis due to the spread of COVID-19 in Indonesia and/or globally (e.g. any regulations issued by the Indonesian Financial Services Authority and/or the Indonesian Stock Exchange).

8. Have restrictions been adopted or put in place that ban the export of protective medical equipment?

Answer:

Under the Regulation of the Minister of Trade No. 23 of 2020 dated 16 March 2020 concerning Temporary Restriction on the Exports of Antiseptic, Mask Raw Materials, Personal Protective Equipment, and Masks (as amended), President Joko Widodo prohibits export of masks and medical equipment. This is instructed in order to meet the hospitals' needs in Indonesia. This prohibition is valid until 30 June 2020.

In addition, based on news articles (<https://www.cnnindonesia.com/ekonomi/20200319110253-92-484845/jokowi-larang-ekspor-masker-dan-alat-kesehatan-karena-corona>), President Joko Widodo also asked his staff to ensure the availability of raw materials for the production of medical equipment in the country so the production is not disrupted.
